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Executive Summary

The Housing Division at the County of Dufferin is responsible for a wide range of housing services, including...

- Administration of the Centralized Waitlist for social housing through Housing Access Dufferin.
- Delivery of the various Rent Supplement Programs offered in Dufferin.
- Management of the Homelessness Prevention Program.
- Delivery of the Homeownership Program and the Ontario Renovates Program.
- Management and operation of the County owned social housing properties.
- Working with Local Housing Providers with funding and administering of non-profit and co-operative housing programs in the County.

In 2013, the County of Dufferin created the 10 Year Housing and Homelessness Plan to improve access to housing that is suitable and affordable for all residents in Dufferin. Long-term planning for the provision of affordable housing will help both the County and local service providers identify goals and set priorities that reflect local needs.

This plan...

- Identified housing and homelessness issues currently facing our community.
- Assessed the current supply of affordable housing and housing programs.
- Established a plan to address affordable housing issues over the next 10 years.
- Identified actions and progress measures to ensure the plan is successful.

The 2014 Update is the County's first opportunity to publicly present a review of the plan, state progress against the plan, and acknowledge the efforts of those contributing to our successes.

Highlights from 2014 include:

- The creation of twenty-four new affordable housing units, including two units modified for accessibility, at 301 First Avenue East., Shelburne, on the former hospital site.
- Increased dialogue and partnering with local agencies, lower-tier governments and the broader community.
- The 2014 Housing Forum, "Housing Solutions for Dufferin County," presented in partnership with Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation.

In this Update, we present new requirements from the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing (MMAH) regarding housing and homelessness plans, we share a summary of progress to date as well as feedback from the 2014 Housing Forum, and we take the opportunity to thank those who have helped us make progress towards our goals.

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New Information from MMAH

In December 2013, Assistant Deputy Minister Janet Hope informed Consolidated Municipal Service Managers of new reporting requirements for 10 year Housing and Homelessness Plans. The new requirements expanded on existing reporting requirements, and made clear the information that Service Managers must present to both MMAH and to the public.

To comply with MMAH requirements, we have included details in this report on the progress made against our 10 year plan, and the measures we use to evaluate our success in meeting our objective and targets. Additionally, we report on the community's awareness of and feedback on the 10 year plan, based on the results of a survey conducted during the 2014 housing forum, and we acknowledge the work of our community partners in the successes achieved so far.



Progress in 2014

Within the Housing and Homelessness Plan, we stated various progress measures, established to ensure that the goals identified were addressed over the 10 year life of the plan. Specifically, we track our efforts related to assisting low-income households, increasing the supply of affordable housing and assisted living, maintaining operating agreements, and expanding community collaboration over short, medium and long term intervals.

On page 4, we present the results of efforts in 2014 to make progress against our measures, on Table 1. The results pertain to the actionable sections of the Plan, regarding specific housing issues, supply and demand analyses, strategic directions, and collaboration and engagement opportunities.

Highlights of our progress in 2014 include:

- The creation of twenty-four new affordable housing units in Shelburne, including two units modified for accessibility, at 301 First Avenue East.
- Increased dialogue and partnering with local agencies, lower-tier governments and the broader community.
- The 2014 Housing Forum, "Housing Solutions for Dufferin County," presented in partnership with Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation.

2014 Housing Forum — “Housing Solutions for Dufferin County”

On Thursday, November 27, 2014, Community Services’ Housing Department, in collaboration with Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation, held the “Housing Solutions for Dufferin County” forum. Presentation made for this forum gave attendees the opportunity to hear about the progress being made against the 10 Year Housing and Homelessness Plan, and to provide feedback on that progress. A survey was conducted with forum attendees to determine their awareness of the Plan, obtain their perspective on progress to date, and hear what steps should be taken in future. Table 2 summarizes the results of the survey.
