



This letter is in response to the Notice of Commencement for the above noted project. The Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP) acknowledges that Dufferin County has indicated that the study is following the approved environmental planning process for a Schedule C project under the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (Class EA).

The updated (February 2021) attached "Areas of Interest" document provides guidance regarding the ministry's interests with respect to the Class EA process. Please address all areas of interest in the EA documentation at an appropriate level for the EA study. Proponents who address all the applicable areas of interest can minimize potential delays to the project schedule. Further information is provided at the end of the Areas of Interest document relating to recent changes to the Environmental Assessment Act through Bill 197, Covid-19 Economic Recovery Act 2020.

The Crown has a legal duty to consult Aboriginal communities when it has knowledge, real or constructive, of the existence or potential existence of an Aboriginal or treaty right and contemplates conduct that may adversely impact that right. Before authorizing this project, the Crown must ensure that its duty to consult has been fulfilled, where such a duty is triggered. Although the duty to consult with Aboriginal peoples is a duty of the Crown, the Crown may delegate procedural aspects of this duty to project proponents while retaining oversight of the consultation process.

The proposed project may have the potential to affect Aboriginal or treaty rights protected under Section 35 of Canada's *Constitution Act* 1982. Where the Crown's duty to consult is triggered in

relation to the proposed project, the MECP is delegating the procedural aspects of rights-based consultation to the proponent through this letter. The Crown intends to rely on the delegated consultation process in discharging its duty to consult and maintains the right to participate in the consultation process as it sees fit.

Based on information provided to date and the Crown's preliminary assessment the proponent is required to consult with the following communities who have been identified as potentially affected by the proposed project:

- Mississaugas of Credit River First Nation
- Chippewas of Rama First Nation
- Chippewas of Georgina Island First Nation
- Beausoleil First Nation
- Huron-Wendat- For Archaeological potential only

Steps that the proponent may need to take in relation to Aboriginal consultation for the proposed project are outlined in the "Code of Practice for Consultation in Ontario's Environmental Assessment Process". Additional information related to Ontario's Environmental Assessment Act is available online at: <a href="https://www.ontario.ca/environmentalassessments">www.ontario.ca/environmentalassessments</a>.

Please also refer to the attached document "A Proponent's Introduction to the Delegation of Procedural Aspects of consultation with Aboriginal Communities" for further information, including the MECP's expectations for EA report documentation related to consultation with communities.

The proponent must contact the Director of Environmental Assessment Branch (EABDirector@ontario.ca) under the following circumstances subsequent to initial discussions with the communities identified by MECP:

- Aboriginal or treaty rights impacts are identified to you by the communities
- You have reason to believe that your proposed project may adversely affect an Aboriginal or treaty right
- Consultation with Indigenous communities or other stakeholders has reached an impasse
- A Part II Order request is expected on the basis of impacts to Aboriginal or treaty rights

The MECP will then assess the extent of any Crown duty to consult for the circumstances and will consider whether additional steps should be taken, including what role you will be asked to play should additional steps and activities be required.

A draft copy of the report should be sent directly to me prior to the filing of the final report, allowing a minimum of 30 days for the ministry's technical reviewers to provide comments.

## □ Planning and Policy

- Projects located in MECP Central Region are subject to <u>A Place to Grow: Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe</u> (2020). Parts of the study area may also be subject to the <u>Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan</u> (2017), <u>Niagara Escarpment Plan</u> (2017), <u>Greenbelt Plan</u> (2017) or <u>Lake Simcoe Protection Plan</u> (2014). #### □ Source Water Protection

The Clean Water Act, 2006 (CWA) aims to protect existing and future sources of drinking water. To achieve this, several types of vulnerable areas have been delineated around surface water intakes and wellheads for every municipal residential drinking water system that is located in a source protection area. These vulnerable areas are known as a Wellhead Protection Areas (WHPAs) and surface water Intake Protection Zones (IPZs). Other vulnerable areas that have been delineated under the CWA include Highly Vulnerable Aquifers (HVAs), Significant Groundwater Recharge Areas (SGRAs), Event-based modelling areas (EBAs), and Issues Contributing Areas (ICAs). Source protection plans have been developed that include policies to address existing and future risks to sources of municipal drinking water within these vulnerable areas.

Projects that are subject to the Environmental Assessment Act that fall under a Class EA, or one of the Regulations, have the potential to impact sources of drinking water if they occur in designated vulnerable areas or in the vicinity of other at-risk drinking water systems (i.e. systems that are not municipal residential systems). MEA Class EA projects may include activities that, if located in a vulnerable area, could be a threat to sources of drinking water (i.e. have the potential to adversely affect the quality or quantity of drinking water sources) and the activity could therefore be subject to policies in a source protection plan. Where an activity poses a risk to drinking water, policies in the local source protection plan may impact how or where that activity is undertaken. Policies may prohibit certain activities, or they may require risk management measures for these activities. Municipal Official Plans, planning decisions, Class EA projects (where the project includes an activity that is a threat to drinking water) and prescribed instruments must conform with policies that address significant risks to drinking water and must have regard for policies that address moderate or low risks.

- In October 2015, the MEA Parent Class EA document was amended to include reference to the Clean Water Act (Section A.2.10.6) and indicates that proponents undertaking a Municipal Class EA project must identify early in their process whether a project is or could potentially be occurring with a vulnerable area. Given this requirement, please include a section in the report on source water protection.
  - The proponent should identify the source protection area and should clearly document how the proximity of the project to sources of drinking water (municipal or other) and any delineated vulnerable areas was considered and assessed. Specifically, the report should discuss whether or not the project is located in a vulnerable area and provide applicable details about the area.

- o If located in a vulnerable area, proponents should document whether any project activities are prescribed drinking water threats and thus pose a risk to drinking water (this should be consulted on with the appropriate Source Protection Authority). Where an activity poses a risk to drinking water, the proponent must document and discuss in the report how the project adheres to or has regard to applicable policies in the local source protection plan. This section should then be used to inform and be reflected in other sections of the report, such as the identification of net positive/negative effects of alternatives, mitigation measures, evaluation of alternatives etc.
- While most source protection plans focused on including policies for significant drinking water threats
  in the WHPAs and IPZs it should be noted that even though source protection plan policies may not
  apply in HVAs, these are areas where aquifers are sensitive and at risk to impacts and within these
  areas, activities may impact the quality of sources of drinking water for systems other than municipal
  residential systems.

#### □ Climate Change

The document "Considering Climate Change in the Environmental Assessment Process" (Guide) is now a part of the Environmental Assessment program's Guides and Codes of Practice. The Guide sets out the MECP's expectation for considering climate change in the preparation, execution and documentation of environmental assessment studies and processes. The guide provides examples, approaches, resources, and references to assist proponents with consideration of climate change in EA. Proponents should review this Guide in detail.

### • The MECP expects proponents of Class EA projects to:

- 1. Consider during the assessment of alternative solutions and alternative designs, the following:
  - a. the project's expected production of greenhouse gas emissions and impacts on carbon sinks (climate change mitigation); and
  - b. resilience or vulnerability of the undertaking to changing climatic conditions (climate change adaptation).
- 2. Include a discrete section in the report detailing how climate change was considered in the EA.

How climate change is considered can be qualitative or quantitative in nature and should be scaled to the project's level of environmental effect. In all instances, both a project's impacts on climate change (mitigation) and impacts of climate change on a project (adaptation) should be considered.

• The MECP has also prepared another guide to support provincial land use planning direction related to the completion of energy and emission plans. The "Community Emissions Reduction Planning: A Guide for Municipalities" document is designed to educate stakeholders on the municipal opportunities to reduce energy and greenhouse gas emissions, and to provide guidance on methods and techniques to incorporate consideration of energy and greenhouse gas emissions into municipal activities of all types. We encourage you to review the Guide for information.

## □ Air Quality, Dust and Noise

- If there are sensitive receptors in the surrounding area of this project, a quantitative air quality/odour impact assessment will be useful to evaluate alternatives, determine impacts and identify appropriate mitigation measures. The scope of the assessment can be determined based on the potential effects of the proposed alternatives, and typically includes source and receptor characterization and a quantification of local air quality impacts on the sensitive receptors and the environment in the study area. The assessment will compare to all applicable standards or guidelines for all contaminants of concern. Please contact this office for further consultation on the level of Air Quality Impact Assessment required for this project if not already advised.
- If a quantitative Air Quality Impact Assessment is not required for the project, the MECP expects that the report contain a qualitative assessment which includes:
  - A discussion of local air quality including existing activities/sources that significantly impact local air quality and how the project may impact existing conditions;
  - A discussion of the nearby sensitive receptors and the project's potential air quality impacts on present and future sensitive receptors;
  - A discussion of local air quality impacts that could arise from this project during both construction and operation; and
  - o A discussion of potential mitigation measures.
- As a common practice, "air quality" should be used an evaluation criterion for all road projects.
- Dust and noise control measures should be addressed and included in the construction plans to
  ensure that nearby residential and other sensitive land uses within the study area are not adversely
  affected during construction activities.
- The MECP recommends that non-chloride dust-suppressants be applied. For a comprehensive list of
  fugitive dust prevention and control measures that could be applied, refer to <u>Cheminfo Services Inc.</u>
  <u>Best Practices for the Reduction of Air Emissions from Construction and Demolition Activities</u> report
  prepared for Environment Canada. March 2005.
- The report should consider the potential impacts of increased noise levels during the operation of the completed project. The proponent should explore all potential measures to mitigate significant noise impacts during the assessment of alternatives.

### □ Ecosystem Protection and Restoration

- Any impacts to ecosystem form and function must be avoided where possible. The report should describe any proposed mitigation measures and how project planning will protect and enhance the local ecosystem.
- Natural heritage and hydrologic features should be identified and described in detail to assess
  potential impacts and to develop appropriate mitigation measures. The following sensitive
  environmental features may be located within or adjacent to the study area:

- Key Natural Heritage Features: Habitat of endangered species and threatened species, fish habitat, wetlands, areas of natural and scientific interest (ANSIs), significant valleylands, significant woodlands; significant wildlife habitat (including habitat of special concern species); sand barrens, savannahs, and tallgrass prairies; and alvars.
- Key Hydrologic Features: Permanent streams, intermittent streams, inland lakes and their littoral zones, seepage areas and springs, and wetlands.
- Other natural heritage features and areas such as: vegetation communities, rare species of flora or fauna, Environmentally Sensitive Areas, Environmentally Sensitive Policy Areas, federal and provincial parks and conservation reserves, Greenland systems etc.

We recommend consulting with the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF), Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO) and your local conservation authority to determine if special measures or additional studies will be necessary to preserve and protect these sensitive features. In addition, you may consider the provisions of the Rouge Park Management Plan if applicable.

- The report must include enough information to demonstrate that there will be no negative impacts on the natural features or ecological functions of any watercourses within the study area. Measures should be included in the planning and design process to ensure that any impacts to watercourses from construction or operational activities (e.g. spills, erosion, pollution) are mitigated as part of the proposed undertaking.
- - Strategies to address potential water quantity and erosion impacts related to stormwater draining into streams or other sensitive environmental features, and to ensure that adequate (enhanced) water quality is maintained
  - Watershed information, drainage conditions, and other relevant background information
  - Future drainage conditions, stormwater management options, information on erosion and sediment control during construction, and other details of the proposed works
  - Information on maintenance and monitoring commitments.
- Ontario Regulation 60/08 under the Ontario Water Resources Act (OWRA) applies to the Lake Simcoe Basin, which encompasses Lake Simcoe and the lands from which surface water drains into Lake Simcoe. If the proposed sewage treatment plant is listed in Table 1 of the regulation, the report should describe how the proposed project and its mitigation measures are consistent with the requirements of this regulation and the OWRA.

Any potential approval requirements for surface water taking or discharge should be identified in the
report. A Permit to Take Water (PTTW) under the OWRA will be required for any water takings that
exceed 50,000 L/day, except for certain water taking activities that have been prescribed by the Water
Taking EASR Regulation – O. Reg. 63/16. These prescribed water-taking activities require registration
in the EASR instead of a PTTW. Please review the Water Taking User Guide for EASR for more
information. Additionally, an Environmental Compliance Approval under the OWRA is required for
municipal stormwater management works.

#### □ Groundwater

- The status of, and potential impacts to any well water supplies should be addressed. If the project involves groundwater takings or changes to drainage patterns, the quantity and quality of groundwater may be affected due to drawdown effects or the redirection of existing contamination flows. In addition, project activities may infringe on existing wells such that they must be reconstructed or sealed and abandoned. Appropriate information to define existing groundwater conditions should be included in the report.
- If the potential construction or decommissioning of water wells is identified as an issue, the report should refer to Ontario Regulation 903, Wells, under the OWRA.
- Potential impacts to groundwater-dependent natural features should be addressed. Any changes to groundwater flow or quality from groundwater taking may interfere with the ecological processes of streams, wetlands or other surficial features. In addition, discharging contaminated or high volumes of groundwater to these features may have direct impacts on their function. Any potential effects should be identified, and appropriate mitigation measures should be recommended. The level of detail required will be dependent on the significance of the potential impacts.
- Any potential approval requirements for groundwater taking or discharge should be identified in the
  report. A Permit to Take Water (PTTW) under the OWRA will be required for any water takings that
  exceed 50,000 L/day, with the exception of certain water taking activities that have been prescribed
  by the Water Taking EASR Regulation O. Reg. 63/16. These prescribed water-taking activities
  require registration in the EASR instead of a PTTW. Please review the Water Taking User Guide for
  EASR for more information.
- Consultation with the railroad authorities is necessary wherever there is a plan to use construction dewatering in the vicinity of railroad lines or where the zone of influence of the construction dewatering potentially intercepts railroad lines.

### □ Excess Materials Management

• In December 2019, MECP released a new regulation under the Environmental Protection Act, titled "On-Site and Excess Soil Management" (O. Reg. 406/19) to support improved management of excess construction soil. This regulation is a key step to support proper management of excess soils, ensuring valuable resources don't go to waste and to provide clear rules on managing and reusing excess soil. New risk-based standards referenced by this regulation help to facilitate local beneficial reuse which in turn will reduce greenhouse gas emissions from soil transportation, while ensuring strong protection of human health and the environment. The new regulation is being phased in over time, with the first phase in effect on January 1, 2021. For more information, please visit https://www.ontario.ca/page/handling-excess-soil.

- The report should reference that activities involving the management of excess soil should be completed in accordance with O. Reg. 406/19 and the MECP's current guidance document titled "Management of Excess Soil – A Guide for Best Management Practices" (2014).
- All waste generated during construction must be disposed of in accordance with ministry requirements

#### □ Contaminated Sites

- Any current or historical waste disposal sites should be identified in the report. The status of these
  sites should be determined to confirm whether approval pursuant to Section 46 of the EPA may be
  required for land uses on former disposal sites. We recommend referring to the <a href="MECP's D-4 guideline">MECP's D-4 guideline</a>
  for land use considerations near landfills and dumps.
  - Resources available may include regional/local municipal official plans and data; provincial data on large landfill sites and small landfill sites; Environmental Compliance Approval information for waste disposal sites on Access Environment.
- Other known contaminated sites (local, provincial, federal) in the study area should also be identified
  in the report (Note information on federal contaminated sites is found on the Government of
  Canada's website).
- The location of any underground storage tanks should be investigated in the report. Measures should
  be identified to ensure the integrity of these tanks and to ensure an appropriate response in the event
  of a spill. The ministry's Spills Action Centre must be contacted in such an event.
- Since the removal or movement of soils may be required, appropriate tests to determine contaminant levels from previous land uses or dumping should be undertaken. If the soils are contaminated, you must determine how and where they are to be disposed of, consistent with Part XV.1 of the Environmental Protection Act (EPA) and Ontario Regulation 153/04, Records of Site Condition, which details the new requirements related to site assessment and clean up. Please contact the appropriate MECP District Office for further consultation if contaminated sites are present.

#### □ Servicing, Utilities and Facilities

- The report should identify any above or underground utilities in the study area such as transmission lines, telephone/internet, oil/gas etc. The owners should be consulted to discuss impacts to this infrastructure, including potential spills.
- The report should identify any servicing infrastructure in the study area such as wastewater, water, stormwater that may potentially be impacted by the project.
- Any facility that releases emissions to the atmosphere, discharges contaminants to ground or surface
  water, provides potable water supplies, or stores, transports or disposes of waste must have an
  Environmental Compliance Approval (ECA) before it can operate lawfully. Please consult with
  MECP's Environmental Permissions Branch to determine whether a new or amended ECA will be
  required for any proposed infrastructure.
- We recommend referring to the ministry's <u>environmental land use planning guides</u> to ensure that any potential land use conflicts are considered when planning for any infrastructure or facilities related to wastewater, pipelines, landfills or industrial uses.

■ Mitiga	tion and	i Moni	toring
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- Contractors must be made aware of all environmental considerations so that all environmental standards and commitments for both construction and operation are met. Mitigation measures should be clearly referenced in the report and regularly monitored during the construction stage of the project. In addition, we encourage proponents to conduct post-construction monitoring to ensure all mitigation measures have been effective and are functioning properly.
- Design and construction reports and plans should be based on a best management approach that centres on the prevention of impacts, protection of the existing environment, and opportunities for rehabilitation and enhancement of any impacted areas.
- The proponent's construction and post-construction monitoring plans must be documented in the report, as outlined in Section A.2.5 and A.4.1 of the MEA Class EA parent document.

#### Consultation

- The report must demonstrate how the consultation provisions of the Class EA have been fulfilled, including documentation of all stakeholder consultation efforts undertaken during the planning process. This includes a discussion in the report that identifies concerns that were raised and describes how they have been addressed by the proponent throughout the planning process. The report should also include copies of comments submitted on the project by interested stakeholders, and the proponent's responses to these comments (as directed by the Class EA to include full documentation).
- Please include the full stakeholder distribution/consultation list in the documentation.

#### □ Class EA Process

- If this project is a Master Plan: there are several different approaches that can be used to conduct a Master Plan, examples of which are outlined in Appendix 4 of the Class EA. The Master Plan should clearly indicate the selected approach for conducting the plan, by identifying whether the levels of assessment, consultation and documentation are sufficient to fulfill the requirements for Schedule B or C projects. Please note that any Schedule B or C projects identified in the plan would be subject to Part II Order Requests under the Environmental Assessment Act, although the plan itself would not be. Please include a description of the approach being undertaken (use Appendix 4 as a reference).
- If this project is a Master Plan: Any identified projects should also include information on the MCEA schedule associated with the project.
- The report should provide clear and complete documentation of the planning process in order to allow for transparency in decision-making.
- The Class EA requires the consideration of the effects of each alternative on all aspects of the environment (including planning, natural, social, cultural, economic, technical). The report should include a level of detail (e.g. hydrogeological investigations, terrestrial and aquatic assessments, cultural heritage assessments) such that all potential impacts can be identified, and appropriate mitigation measures can be developed. Any supporting studies conducted during the Class EA process should be referenced and included as part of the report.
- Please include in the report a list of all subsequent permits or approvals that may be required for the
  implementation of the preferred alternative, including but not limited to, MECP's PTTW, EASR
  Registrations and ECAs, conservation authority permits, species at risk permits, MTO permits and
  approvals under the *Impact Assessment Act*, 2019.

## Amendments to the EAA through the Covid-19 Economic Recovery Act, 2020

Once the EA Report is finalized, the proponent must issue a Notice of Completion providing a minimum 30-day period during which documentation may be reviewed and comment and input can be submitted to the proponent. The Notice of Completion must be sent to the appropriate MECP Regional Office email address (for projects in MECP Southwest Region, the email is eanotification.swregion@ontario.ca).

The public has the ability to request a higher level of assessment on a project if they are concerned about potential adverse impacts to constitutionally protected Aboriginal and treaty rights. In addition, the Minister may issue an order on his or her own initiative within a specified time period. The Director (of the Environmental Assessment Branch) will issue a Notice of Proposed Order to the proponent if the Minister is considering an order for the project within 30 days after the conclusion of the comment period on the Notice of Completion. At this time, the Director may request additional information from the proponent. Once the requested information has been received, the Minister will have 30 days within which to make a decision or impose conditions on your project.

Therefore, the proponent cannot proceed with the project until at least 30 days after the end of the comment period provided for in the Notice of Completion. Further, the proponent may not proceed after this time if:

- a Part II Order request has been submitted to the ministry regarding potential adverse impacts to constitutionally protected Aboriginal and treaty rights, or
- the Director has issued a Notice of Proposed order regarding the project.

Please ensure that the Notice of Completion advises that outstanding concerns are to be directed to the proponent for a response, and that in the event there are outstanding concerns regarding potential adverse impacts to constitutionally protected Aboriginal and treaty rights, Part II Order requests on those matters should be addressed in writing to:

# A PROPONENT'S INTRODUCTION TO THE DELEGATION OF PROCEDURAL ASPECTS OF CONSULTATION WITH ABORIGINAL COMMUNITIES

#### DEFINITIONS

The following definitions are specific to this document and may not apply in other contexts:

**Aboriginal communities** – the First Nation or Métis communities identified by the Crown for the purpose of consultation.

**Consultation** – the Crown's legal obligation to consult when the Crown has knowledge of an established or asserted Aboriginal or treaty right and contemplates conduct that might adversely impact that right. This is the type of consultation required pursuant to s. 35 of the *Constitution Act*, 1982. Note that this definition does not include consultation with Aboriginal communities for other reasons, such as regulatory requirements.

Crown - the Ontario Crown, acting through a particular ministry or ministries.

**Procedural aspects of consultation** – those portions of consultation related to the process of consultation, such as notifying an Aboriginal community about a project, providing information about the potential impacts of a project, responding to concerns raised by an Aboriginal community and proposing changes to the project to avoid negative impacts.

**Proponent** – the person or entity that wants to undertake a project and requires an Ontario Crown decision or approval for the project.

#### I. PURPOSE

The Crown has a legal duty to consult Aboriginal communities when it has knowledge of an existing or asserted Aboriginal or treaty right and contemplates conduct that may adversely impact that right. In outlining a framework for the duty to consult, the Supreme Court of Canada has stated that the Crown may delegate procedural aspects of consultation to third parties. This document provides general information about the Ontario Crown's approach to delegation of the procedural aspects of consultation to proponents.

This document is not intended to instruct a proponent about an individual project, and it does not constitute legal advice.

#### II. WHY IS IT NECESSARY TO CONSULT WITH ABORIGINAL COMMUNITIES?

The objective of the modern law of Aboriginal and treaty rights is the *reconciliation* of Aboriginal peoples and non-Aboriginal peoples and their respective rights, claims and interests. Consultation is an important component of the reconciliation process.

The Crown has a legal duty to consult Aboriginal communities when it has knowledge of an existing or asserted Aboriginal or treaty right and contemplates conduct that might adversely impact that right. For example, the Crown's duty to consult is triggered when it considers issuing a permit, authorization or approval for a project which has the potential to adversely impact an Aboriginal right, such as the right to hunt, fish, or trap in a particular area.

The scope of consultation required in particular circumstances ranges across a spectrum depending on both the nature of the asserted or established right and the seriousness of the potential adverse impacts on that right.

Depending on the particular circumstances, the Crown may also need to take steps to accommodate the potentially impacted Aboriginal or treaty right. For example, the Crown may be required to avoid or minimize the potential adverse impacts of the project.

# III. THE CROWN'S ROLE AND RESPONSIBILITIES IN THE DELEGATED CONSULTATION PROCESS

The Crown has the responsibility for ensuring that the duty to consult, and accommodate where appropriate, is met. However, the Crown may delegate the procedural aspects of consultation to a proponent.

There are different ways in which the Crown may delegate the procedural aspects of consultation to a proponent, including through a letter, a memorandum of understanding, legislation, regulation, policy and codes of practice.

If the Crown decides to delegate procedural aspects of consultation, the Crown will generally:

- Ensure that the delegation of procedural aspects of consultation and the responsibilities of the proponent are clearly communicated to the proponent;
- Identify which Aboriginal communities must be consulted;
- Provide contact information for the Aboriginal communities;
- Revise, as necessary, the list of Aboriginal communities to be consulted as new information becomes available and is assessed by the Crown;
- Assess the scope of consultation owed to the Aboriginal communities;
- Maintain appropriate oversight of the actions taken by the proponent in fulfilling the procedural aspects of consultation;
- Assess the adequacy of consultation that is undertaken and any accommodation that may be required;
- Provide a contact within any responsible ministry in case issues arise that require direction from the Crown; and
- Participate in the consultation process as necessary and as determined by the Crown.

# IV. THE PROPONENT'S ROLE AND RESPONSIBILITIES IN THE DELEGATED CONSULTATION PROCESS

Where aspects of the consultation process have been delegated to a proponent, the Crown, in meeting its duty to consult, will rely on the proponent's consultation activities and documentation of those activities. The consultation process informs the Crown's decision of whether or not to approve a proposed project or activity.

A proponent's role and responsibilities will vary depending on a variety of factors including the extent of consultation required in the circumstance and the procedural aspects of consultation the Crown has delegated to it. Proponents are often in a better position than the Crown to discuss a project and its potential impacts with Aboriginal communities and to determine ways to avoid or minimize the adverse impacts of a project.

A proponent can raise issues or questions with the Crown at any time during the consultation process. If issues or concerns arise during the consultation that cannot be addressed by the proponent, the proponent should contact the Crown.

# a) What might a proponent be required to do in carrying out the procedural aspects of consultation?

Where the Crown delegates procedural aspects of consultation, it is often the proponent's responsibility to provide notice of the proposed project to the identified Aboriginal communities. The notice should indicate that the Crown has delegated the procedural aspects of consultation to the proponent and should include the following information:

- a description of the proposed project or activity;
- mapping;
- proposed timelines;
- details regarding anticipated environmental and other impacts;
- details regarding opportunities to comment; and
- any changes to the proposed project that have been made for seasonal conditions or other factors, where relevant.

Proponents should provide enough information and time to allow Aboriginal communities to provide meaningful feedback regarding the potential impacts of the project. Depending on the nature of consultation required for a project, a proponent also may be required to:

- provide the Crown with copies of any consultation plans prepared and an opportunity to review and comment;
- ensure that any necessary follow-up discussions with Aboriginal communities take place in a timely manner, including to confirm receipt of information, share and update information and to address questions or concerns that may arise;
- as appropriate, discuss with Aboriginal communities potential mitigation measures and/or changes to the project in response to concerns raised by Aboriginal communities;
- use language that is accessible and not overly technical, and translate material into Aboriginal languages where requested or appropriate;
- bear the reasonable costs associated with the consultation process such as, but not limited to, meeting hall rental, meal costs, document translation(s), or to address technical & capacity issues;
- provide the Crown with all the details about potential impacts on established or asserted Aboriginal or treaty rights, how these concerns have been considered and addressed by the proponent and the Aboriginal communities and any steps taken to mitigate the potential impacts;
- provide the Crown with complete and accurate documentation from these meetings and communications; and
- notify the Crown immediately if an Aboriginal community not identified by the Crown approaches the proponent seeking consultation opportunities.

#### b) What documentation and reporting does the Crown need from the proponent?

Proponents should keep records of all communications with the Aboriginal communities involved in the consultation process and any information provided to these Aboriginal communities.

As the Crown is required to assess the adequacy of consultation, it needs documentation to satisfy itself that the proponent has fulfilled the procedural aspects of consultation delegated to it. The documentation required would typically include:

- the date of meetings, the agendas, any materials distributed, those in attendance and copies
  of any minutes prepared;
- the description of the proposed project that was shared at the meeting;
- any and all concerns or other feedback provided by the communities;
- any information that was shared by a community in relation to its asserted or established Aboriginal or treaty rights and any potential adverse impacts of the proposed activity, approval or disposition on such rights;
- any proposed project changes or mitigation measures that were discussed, and feedback from Aboriginal communities about the proposed changes and measures;
- any commitments made by the proponent in response to any concerns raised, and feedback from Aboriginal communities on those commitments;
- copies of correspondence to or from Aboriginal communities, and any materials distributed electronically or by mail;
- information regarding any financial assistance provided by the proponent to enable participation by Aboriginal communities in the consultation;
- periodic consultation progress reports or copies of meeting notes if requested by the Crown;
- a summary of how the delegated aspects of consultation were carried out and the results; and
- a summary of issues raised by the Aboriginal communities, how the issues were addressed and any outstanding issues.

In certain circumstances, the Crown may share and discuss the proponent's consultation record with an Aboriginal community to ensure that it is an accurate reflection of the consultation process.

# c) Will the Crown require a proponent to provide information about its commercial arrangements with Aboriginal communities?

The Crown may require a proponent to share information about aspects of commercial arrangements between the proponent and Aboriginal communities where the arrangements:

- include elements that are directed at mitigating or otherwise addressing impacts of the project;
- include securing an Aboriginal community's support for the project; or
- may potentially affect the obligations of the Crown to the Aboriginal communities.

The proponent should make every reasonable effort to exempt the Crown from confidentiality provisions in commercial arrangements with Aboriginal communities to the extent necessary to allow this information to be shared with the Crown.

The Crown cannot guarantee that information shared with the Crown will remain confidential. Confidential commercial information should not be provided to the Crown as part of the consultation record if it is not relevant to the duty to consult or otherwise required to be submitted to the Crown as part of the regulatory process.

# V. WHAT ARE THE ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF ABORIGINAL COMMUNITIES' IN THE CONSULTATION PROCESS?

Like the Crown, Aboriginal communities are expected to engage in consultation in good faith. This includes:

- responding to the consultation notice;
- engaging in the proposed consultation process;
- providing relevant documentation;
- clearly articulating the potential impacts of the proposed project on Aboriginal or treaty rights;
   and
- discussing ways to mitigates any adverse impacts.

Some Aboriginal communities have developed tools, such as consultation protocols, policies or processes that provide guidance on how they would prefer to be consulted. Although not legally binding, proponents are encouraged to respect these community processes where it is reasonable to do so. Please note that there is no obligation for a proponent to pay a fee to an Aboriginal community in order to enter into a consultation process.

To ensure that the Crown is aware of existing community consultation protocols, proponents should contact the relevant Crown ministry when presented with a consultation protocol by an Aboriginal community or anyone purporting to be a representative of an Aboriginal community.

# VI. WHAT IF MORE THAN ONE PROVINCIAL CROWN MINISTRY IS INVOLVED IN APPROVING A PROPONENT'S PROJECT?

Depending on the project and the required permits or approvals, one or more ministries may delegate procedural aspects of the Crown's duty to consult to the proponent. The proponent may contact individual ministries for guidance related to the delegation of procedural aspects of consultation for ministry-specific permits/approvals required for the project in question. Proponents are encouraged to seek input from all involved Crown ministries sooner rather than later.






## **Environmental Assessment Process**

Given this, the Environmental Assessment Study will evaluate alternatives that will:





## Future Traffic Operations – 2027 Do Nothing Scenario




SBLR – Southbound Left Right NBL – Northbound Left



Further to our meeting this morning, attached is a Routing Study for Riddell Road prepared by Triton Engineering for the County back in 2004. According to Howard with Triton, the study was ultimately "Received" by County Council, but not adopted and nothing further was done with it. There was refluctance to deal with the substantive property issues. Attached is the text of the Report (believed to be final) and two versions of the alignment figures. The June 3 version was final, and showed two options, both connecting directly to CR 16. The March 30 version also showed a direct alignment with Hansen, but floward recalls being asked to remove it from the final report because essentially, it was a County Study and they did not want to show a direct connection between Riddell and Hansen. The reasons are outlined in the "Discussion/Recommendation" document

believe the Harmount and Valleygrove subdivisions now underway in Amaranth eliminate the possibility of the Alternative A and B alignments as shown. This realistically brings the Alternative C. alignment back into question, with a possible westward extension of Hansen towards 2<sup>nd</sup> Line.

Looking at this holistically, we believe there should at least be consideration to a future collector road connection between Veterans Way and 2<sup>nd</sup> time, along with a northern extension of Riddell Road, included with this exercise. It would seem feasible that this could be an extension of Hansen Boulevard that roughly follows the rail trail alignment. This could take some pressure off Broadway by providing an alternative route, possibly providing relief to the County Road 3/109/23 intersection issue at-hand,

and I am a resident of Orangeville. I have looked at the map and the realignment but please excuse, as a layman I did not see what the outcome would be visually.

One thing, sir, I would like to propose are more roundabouts, Mr. Sears, the traffic has increased greatly in and around Orangeville. I think it would be wise to focus on traffic flow and loss stop and go. There is too much 'braking' so to speak and I think that one behavioural outcome is that people who must get into work on time, try dodging traffic going through the neighborhood.

Another factor is that a roundabout can be 'greened' up, which might coincide with a more environmental approach. The increase of traffic lights impedes traffic flow and quite frankly sir, becomes

annoying and trying because timing becomes more risky with more stop and go. There was reluctance to deal with the substantive property issues. Attached is the text of the Report (believed to be final) and two versions of the alignment Figures. The June 3 version was final, and showed two options, both connecting directly to CR 16. The March 30 version also showed a direct alignment with Hansen, but Howard recalls being asked to remove it from the final report because essentially, it was a County Study and they did not want to show a direct connection between Riddell and Hansen. The reasons are outlined in the "Discussion/Recommendation" document.  I believe the Hamount and Valleygrove subdivisions now underway in Amaranth eliminate the possibility of the Alternative A and B alignments as shown. This realistically brings the Alternative C alignment back into question, with a possible westward extension of Hansen towards 2nd Line. 

We would like to begin by respectfully acknowledging that Dufferin County resides within the traditional territory and ancestral lands of the Tionontati (Petun), Attawandaron (Neutral), Haudenosaunee (Six Nations), and Anishinaabe peoples.

We also acknowledge that various municipalities within the County of Dufferin reside within the treaty lands named under the Haldimand Deed of 1784 and two of the Williams Treaties of 1818: Treaty 18: the Nottawasaga Purchase, and Treaty 19: The Ajetance Treaty.



This realignment could precipitate a domino effect on traffic impacting other intersections in the surrounding area.

Enhance safety of all users and all modes in the surrounding area




Accommodate existing and future traffic demand

- Preliminary alternative concepts for consideration.




# Common feedback themes:







County Road 109 – As part of this project should one consider the possibility the road might be uploaded back up to the Province (it is my understanding this used to be Provincial Highway 9)?

With a number of intersecting roads involved, and the likelihood traffic will increase, as a big fan, I would respectfully ask that a roundabout be considered. Whilst I am not aware of the ownership of the lands adjacent to the current intersections, I would suggest there is ample space to build a roundabout to accommodate both passenger and commercial vehicles as well as busses and lorries. If considered necessary, the roundbout could always have traffic lights for peak hours only.

With this in mind, I would keep  $2^{nd}$  Line as part of the Dufferin Road 3 and Dufferin Road 23 intersections with Dufferin Road 109 (this is where I suggest a roundabout be considered) and leave the intersection of County Road 11 and County Road 3 as is (perhaps with better signage and improvement of the intersection such as a proper left turn lane on Eastbound County Rd 3 – long enough to accommodate a lorry).

I had not seen the "preferred" solution when I wrote earlier. What occurs to me now is that Highway 109 is really a provincial road (downgraded by former Premier Harris) and it will only grow busier with heavy truck traffic as urban development moves north.

Highway 109 will inevitably become a divided highway with at least two lanes in each direction. Therefore, provision should be made around those intersections for clover leaf junctions.

The Highway 109 bypass now has seven traffic lights between the west and east ends of Orangeville. Its future extensions and upogrades should include parallel servioce roads to minimize the number of traffic lights. It is really a provincial highway; so is Highway 89, which can yet be protected from adjacent growth.

Have you considred restoring railways bypassing the GTA?

Thank you for your information. I examined the map of the Technical Study # 2 and have a few comments.

1. Bobolinks and Meadowlarks did not dwell in Ontario much until farers cleared their forests to plant grain. They are now here in much greater numbers; the only reason they are "endangered" is because they are still in small numbers because south Ontario is rapidly being paved over. I suggest that their survival is assured and the site of a "potentially suitable" habitat need not be a factor in aligning roads.

For then same reason, the discovery of one Monartch butterfly is insignificant. My neighbour counts hundreds of Monarchs on his 50 acres of planted trees and I see them regularly on my 48 acres, because both of us have far too many milkweeds growing among our planted trees. You can safely ignore "one Monarch."

I planted Butternut seedlings but when former Ptremier McGuinty made them "endangered" I cut them down, because ti did not want to be jailed and bankrupted for "possessing" them. Two years later McGuinth declared that if I planted Butternut treesI could treat them as I wishe. meanwhile, many of my 600 destroyed Butternuts grew from their roots. Butternut trees are hard to kill and are still growing in Dufferin County; so you can ignoire all environmental concerns.

Last February I ran into a large snowdrift on County Road 3 just west of County Road 11, throwing my car into the oncoming traffic lane. It was by brute force alone that I was able to swerve back enough to avoid a collision, and my car sustained several hundred dollars of damage (including the power steeering), requiring a tow and repairs. I suggest that live "snow fences" (trees) be planted in places where snowdrifts are common. This is much more important to driver safety than nonexistent environmental concerns.

Studying the road alignments, it seems to me that both the B Line (County Road 23) and A Line (County Road 11) intersections with Highway 109 are important and needed, and that the B Line road junction should favour County Road 3 by moving its junction with Highway 109 just west of its current junction. The County Road 11-Highway 109 junction is satisfactory as it is (I drive it frequently), but snowdrift protrection is badly needed in that area.

If the B Line-County Road 3 is adjusted westward, the cut-off triangle will be useless for farming as it is too small for retention for field crops. It may be useful as a gas station or similar industrial-commercial site or for residential expansion.

These observations are from a farmer's point of view; political considerations may intrude, but otherwise I think my suggestions are sound. However, consult the present landowners. It is a great pity that alignment of Riddell Road with County Road 3 was not considered before residences were built at the corner north of Hunter Road.

Two years ago I gave my copy of a US Army Engineer manual on urban design to Dufferin County. You may find it useful.

With a number of intersecting roads involved, and the likelihood traffic will increase, as a big fan, I would respectfully ask that a roundabout be considered. Whilst I am not aware of the ownership of the lands adjacent to the current intersections, I would suggest there is ample space to build a roundabout to accommodate both passenger and commercial vehicles as well as busses and lorries.  If considered necessary, the roundabout could always have traffic lights for peak hours only. With this in mind, I would keep 2nd Line as part of the Dufferin Road 3 and Dufferin Road 23 intersections with Dufferin Road 109 (this is where I suggest a roundabout be considered) and leave the intersection of County Road 11 and County Road 3 as is (perhaps with better signage and improvement of the intersection such as a proper left turn lane on Eastbound County Rd 3 – long enough to accommodate a lorry). Bobolinks and Meadowlarks did not dwell in Ontario much until farers cleared their forests to plant grain. They are now here in much greater numbers; the only reason they are "endangered" is because they are still in small numbers because south Ontario is rapidly being paved over. I suggest that their survival is assured and the site of a "potentially suitable" habitat need not be a factor in aligning roads.  For then same reason, the discovery of one Monarch butterfly is insignificant. My neighbor counts hundreds of Monarchs on his 50 acres of planted trees and I see them regularly on my 48 acres, because both of us have far too many milkweeds growing among our planted trees. You can safely ignore "one Monarch."  I planted Butternut seedlings but when former Premier McGuinty made them "endangered" I cut them down, because ti did not want to be jailed and bankrupted for "possessing" them. Two years later McGuinty declared that if I planted Butternut trees could treat them as I wished. meanwhile, many of my 600 destroyed Butternuts grew from their roots. Butternut trees are hard to kill and are still growing in Dufferin County; so you can ignore all environmental concerns. 		Last February I ran into a large snowdrift on County Road 3 just west of County Road 11, throwing my car into the oncoming traffic lane. It was by brute force alone that I was able to swerve back enough to avoid a collision, and my car sustained several hundred dollars of damage (including the power steering), requiring a tow and repairs. I suggest that live "snow fences" (trees) be planted in places where snowdrifts are common. This is much more important to driver safety than nonexistent environmental concerns.  Studying the road alignments, it seems to me that both the B Line (County Road 23) and A Line (County Road 11) intersections with Highway 109 are		

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		County Road 3 by moving its junction with Highway 109 just west of its current junction. The County Road 11-Highway 109 junction is satisfactory as it is (I drive it frequently), but snowdrift protection is badly needed in that area.		
		If the B Line-County Road 3 is adjusted westward, the cut-off triangle will be useless for farming as it is too small for retention for field crops. It may be useful as a gas station or similar industrial-commercial site or for residential expansion.		
		These observations are from a farmer's point of view; political considerations may intrude, but otherwise I think my suggestions are sound. However, consult the present landowners. It is a great pity that alignment of Riddell Road with County Road 3 was not considered before residences were built at the corner north of Hunter Road.		
		Two years ago I gave my copy of a US Army Engineer manual on urban design to Dufferin County. You may find it useful.		
		Dear Christine:		
		I had not seen the "preferred" solution when I wrote earlier. What occurs to me now is that Highway 109 is really a provincial road (downgraded by former Premier Harris) and it will only grow busier with heavy truck traffic as urban development moves north.		
		Highway 109 will inevitably become a divided highway with at least two lanes in each direction. Therefore, provision should be made around those intersections for clover leaf junctions.		
		The Highway 109 bypass now has seven traffic lights between the west and east ends of Orangeville. Its future extensions and upgrades should include parallel service roads to minimize the number of traffic lights. It is really a provincial highway; so is Highway 89, which can yet be protected from adjacent growth.		
		Have you considered restoring railways bypassing the GTA?
