


# 10 Year Housing and Homelessness Plan 2017 Update

#### **Executive Summary**

The Housing Division at the County of Dufferin provides a wide range of housing services, including...

- Administration of Dufferin County's Centralized Waitlist for social housing.
- Delivery of various Rent Supplement Programs offered in Dufferin.
- Management of the Homelessness Prevention Program.
- Delivery of the Homeownership Program and the Ontario Renovates Program.
- Management and operation of the County owned social housing properties.
- Working with Local Housing Providers to fund and administer non-profit and co-operative housing programs in the County.



The plan...

- Identified housing and homelessness issues currently facing our community.
- Assessed the current supply of affordable housing and housing programs.
- Established a plan to address affordable housing issues over the next 10 years.
- Identified actions and progress measures to ensure the plan is successful.

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In this 2017 Update, the County has the opportunity to publicly present a review of the plan, state progress against the plan, and acknowledge the efforts of those contributing to our successes.

Highlights from 2017 include:

- Continued partnerships and relationship building efforts with community agencies, e.g. Poverty Reduction Task Force and DC MOVES.
- The 2017 Housing Forum with its theme of "Working Together." Attendees included local support agencies and local housing providers and keynote speakers included CAEH trainer, Wally Czech and RentSmart's Sherry Madden.
- The ongoing development of the new mixed 24 unit Housing Development at 54 Lawrence Avenue, Orangeville.

In this Update, the Director of Community Services shares background on the plan and the vision for moving forward, then we share a summary of the progress made in 2017 as well as feedback from the 2017 Housing Forum, and we take the opportunity to thank those partners who have helped us make progress towards our goals this past year.



## 10 Year Housing and Homelessness Plan 2017 Update

#### A message from the Director of Community Services

2017, similar to previous years, continued to allow housing staff to gauge and investigate housing and homelessness issues in Dufferin County. County Council began to consider the redevelopment of County assets and the creation of new properties that aimed to improve and enhance the County housing stock. Housing staff continue to work with tenants to improve their living situations and promote energy efficiencies that reduce the carbon footprints in our directly operated units.

As the Federal and Provincial governments continue to invest in social housing, the County will continue to steward the initiatives of both governments and align new possibilities with local strategic plans. The County continues to collaborate with local agencies to improve and address poverty, housing and homelessness issues as a whole. Stronger relationships with local organizations will create stronger pathways to success that emphasize community wellbeing. Local partnerships will continue to be the mission in 2018 as integrated local service alignment has become a new normal in Dufferin County.



The Community Services Department's current Service Delivery Modernization Project (SDM) will aim to better deliver all social service programs allowing those utilizing services a more transparent and seamless experience. Ongoing relationships with agencies that focus on the creation of social housing will also be a priority in 2018. It is apparent to County staff that such partnerships are not just good opportunities but are essential for the future development of rural communities.

The coming year will bring new and exciting experiences to those committed to addressing housing and homelessness. As a smaller Service Manager, Dufferin County continues to challenge the current state in efforts to create a continuum of housing services that addresses the diverse needs of our growing community. The County await the new National Housing Strategy (NHS) expected to be launched in 2018.

We thank those of you who have joined us in taking steps toward meeting our goals, and open the invitation to others to join the collaboration on improving the housing and homelessness services for the residents of Dufferin County.

#### **Progress in 2017**

Our Housing and Homelessness Plan stated various progress measures that were established to ensure that the goals identified were addressed over the 10 year life of the plan. Specifically, we plan to track the County's efforts related to assisting low-income households, increasing the supply of affordable housing and assisted living, maintaining operating agreements with housing providers, and expanding community collaboration. All goals will be tracked over short, medium and long term intervals.

On Table 1, which starts on page 4, we present the results of efforts in 2017 that show progress against our measures. The results pertain to the actionable sections of the Plan, regarding specific housing issues, supply and demand analyses, strategic directions, and collaboration and engagement opportunities.

## 2017 Housing Forum: "Working Together to Serve Better"

The theme of the Housing Forum, held on November 22<sup>nd</sup> 2017 to coincide with National Housing Day, was "Working Together." The day included a variety of speakers. Wally Czech, Trainer from the Canadian Alliance to End Homelessness, presented on the Housing First philosophy. Sherry Madden, Provincial Community Engagement Coordinator – RentSmart, discussed the 'RentSmart' program. The event focused on sharing information, raising awareness and getting feedback on the work being done for Poverty Reduction, Housing and Homelessness in Dufferin. Attendees were given an update on the County's 10 Year Housing and Homelessness Plan and were presented with opportunities to join in the collaboration. The results of the 2016 20,000 Homes Campaign Homeless Enumeration exercise were also presented to the group. During the forum, attendees were surveyed about their awareness of the Plan and to gather their input on the plan and its goals. The responses to the survey are noted in Table 2, along with comparisons to responses obtained in 2016.
